With great pleasure we announce the 7th year of Newcastle Festival of Jazz and Improvised Music.

Launched 2017, the festival continues to respond to the city's appetite for a contemporary grass roots jazz festival, presenting an innovative and diverse international line up, celebrating and pushing boundaries that challenge perceptions of jazz and improvised music.

This year we welcome new performance spaces including the Jesmond United Reformed Church and Blank Studios, alongside our regular venues Bobiks, The Globe and the Newcastle Literary and Philosophical Society.

We are also especially delighted to include three performances from the Edith Adamson Carillon at Newcastle Civic Centre. A landmark on the Newcastle Skyline the carillon is the heaviest of its kind in the world, with a total metal mass of 22 tonnes, what a treat to hear the 25 bells ringing out across the city through a specially commissioned festival piece for our three weekends.

We continue to work with our lead partners Jazz North East, but also other key regional promoters including Jazz.Coop, GemArts and the Thursday Night Prayer Meeting.

Alongside British and International UK based artists this year we're delighted to be bringing musicians from Italy, Switzerland, France and multiple Scandinavian regions.

Newcastle Festival of Jazz and Improvised Music gratefully acknowledges Arts Council England, associated partners and funders for their support.

Our festival this year is dedicated in memory of Steve Horowitz who recently passed, a tireless supporter of the Tyneside jazz scene who will be sadly missed but never forgotten.

Newcastle Civic Centre

Age Restrictions: All ages welcome.

Accessibility: The Civic Centre Gardens is a fully accessible city centre public green space best accessed from Haymarket Bus Station or Metro Station. Accessible toilets are available on the ground floor of the Civic Centre.

Travel: Haymarket Bus Station is located 0.2 miles from the Civic Centre Gardens (approximately 5 minutes walking time).

Haymarket Metro Station is located 0.1 miles from the Civic Centre Gardens just across the street (approximately 3 minutes walking time).

There is parking available at The Civic Centre Sandyford Square.

Jesmond United Reform Church

Age Restrictions: All ages welcome.

Accessibility: Fully accessible for wheelchair users.

Travel: Jesmond Metro is located 0.4 miles from the Church (approximately 7 minutes walking time).

Q3 QuayCity Bus to Osborne Road-Nuffield Hospital (Stop ID: twramtjp) is 0.2 miles (approximately 4 minutes walking time).

There is limited street parking surrounding the Church on Burdon Terrace and Tankerville Terrace (Charges may apply).

Bobiks at The Punch Bowl

Age Restrictions: 16+ (under 18's accompanied by an adult).

Accessibility: Bobiks is an upstairs performance space preceded by 25 stairs and therefore unaccessible for wheelchair users.

Travel: Jesmond Metro located half a mile from Bobiks at The Punch Bowl (approximately 10 minutes walking time).

Cradlewell Bus Stops are less than 1000 ft from the venue which is visible from the stops Bus numbers: 38 / 51 / 52 / 62 / 63 / 38 / 308 / 309.

There is limited street parking available near the venue (Charges may apply).

Blank Studios

Age Restrictions: All ages welcome.

Accessibility: The Blank Studios recording and performance space is fully accessible for wheelchair users, fully accessible toilets are available in the Star and Shadow venue next door to Blank Studios.

Travel: Blank Studios is located just next to the Star and Shadow Cinema.

Buses: 1 / 32 / 32A are located just a few meters away from the studio (approximately 1 minutes walking time).

Jesmond Metro located 0.6 miles from Blank Studios (approximately 13 minutes walking time).

There is limited street parking available (Charges may apply).

The Literary and Philosophical Society

Age Restrictions: All ages welcome with under 18's accompanied by an adult.

Accessibility: The Loftus Room at The Lit and Phil is partly accessible. There is a lift at the venue entrance for wheelchair users to access the building and performance space, no wheelchair accessible toilets are available in the building.

The festival has permissions for visiting wheelchair users to access toilets located on the ground floor in Sleeperz Hotel which is just a few doors down (16 ft) to the right of the Lit and Phil as you exit the building.

Accessible toilets are also available at Central Station and 5 Quarter Cafe Bar.

The Members Library is not a wheelchair accessible space and is preceded by a small number of stairs.

Travel: Any Bus and Metro to Central Station which is located less than 300 ft from the venue (approximately 2 minutes walk).

There is limited street parking, the closest car park is at Central Station (Charges may apply).

The Globe

Age Restrictions: All ages welcome with under 18's accompanied by an adult.

Accessibility: Fully accessible for wheelchair users, a lift facility is available to access an upstairs fully accessible toilet.

Travel: Central Station Metro is located just under half a mile from the venue (approximately 8 minutes walk).

Buses: 12 / 12A / 22 / 22X to Scotswood Road.

Limited street parking outside of the venue, a small fee based car park is located across the road (Charges may apply).



Jonathan Bradley - The Edith Adamson Carillon

Jonathan Bradley (Carillon)
Paul Taylor (Compositions and Recording)

A centrepiece for this years' festival will be three performances through the Edith Adamson Carillon at Newcastle Civic Centre. Regional pianist Paul Taylor will produce an improvisational score entitled 'Permutations' to be performed by acting Carillon caretaker and Council commissioned instrument player Jonathan Bradley. Bringing together our three weekends of music each performance will remain unique through the improvisational nature of the composition Paul has created, and subsequent interpretation by Jonathan.

Jonathan started regular recitals in 2015 (Previously the carillon has been played by Richard Jennings, Chris Briggs, John Knox, and Dr. Ian Brunt) and expressed his great enthusiasm for this prestigious and historically significant instrument to become part of the festival.

Heard over a great distance, the Carillon performances will extend to a great audience, celebrating Newcastle's heritage and encouraging audiences into the outdoor green space surrounding the Civic Centre (the Carillon is situated in the Belfry with the bells played being heard outside and across the city).

The Edith Adamson Carillon has taken pride of place on Newcastle's skyline since completed construction in 1967. The 25 bells that make the Carillon were cast in 1966 and bequeathed to Newcastle City Council by James Adamson in memory of his wife, Edith Annie Adamson who died in the same year work commenced on the Civic Centre. The Carillon is the heaviest of its kind in the world, with a total metal mass of 22 tonnes. The Carillon Tower is adorned with 12 large and 8 small seahorses designed by J. R. M. Cheyne as part of the original building design.

For Newcastle Festival of Jazz and Improvised Music 2023 regional musician Paul Taylor will be working on a number of festival specific commissions entitled 'Permutations' and 'Interludes'.

The first of these will be an improvisational score to be performed on three occasions by Jonathan Bradley on the Edith Adamson Carillon, this music will be heard outdoors and across the city. Paul will also be recording a series of electronically composed interlude pieces which will be broadcast through venue PA systems before, during and after festival live concert performances. The electronic compositions will be designed in such a way as to embody audio motifs that are shared with the Carillon score, therefore uniting the outdoor and indoor performances and providing a festival soundtrack, creating a sense of identity, uniform and association throughout and across events. The electronic scores will be produced on CD and issued through our associated New Jazz and Improvised Music Recordings project, available to interested audiences throughout the festival.

Born in and currently residing in Newcastle, Paul has heard the Carillon bells throughout his life, as one of the regions most exciting improvisers he is the perfect artist to produce this work, and we're delighted to invite him to the festival to do so.

Gabriele Mitelli (Trumpet / Soprano Sax / Electronics / Voice / Percussion) John Edwards (Double Bass) Mark Sanders (Drums / Objects)

Gabriele Mitelli has created an international ensemble for his new trio, a programmatic departure from the commonplace, comfortable formulas and the familiar. For a journey to the heart of improvisation in which jazz once again becomes a constant gamble, an extreme practice, a risk to be taken to go one step further each time. Fellow adventurers are two English musicians who have made noise and rebellion into a life project: John Edwards on double bass and Mark Sanders on drums. The three are indefatigable experimenters, heard alongside Evan Parker, Rob Mazurek, Roscoe Mitchell, Sunny Murray, Peter Brötzmann, Louis Moholo, and Wadada Leo Smith; names and experiences that speak of courage and freedom, honesty and dedication, that are more than a calling card. So brace yourselves: there is a whole world to discover.

John Pope Quintet

An all-star lineup of dynamic Northern musicians, this all-acoustic quintet is the primary working band of Newcastle bass player John Pope, one of the most compelling new voices in UK jazz.

Drawing on the history of 60s free jazz and hard bop, but with a modern sensibility grounded in the sounds of today's European scene, they play hard-grooving, anything-goes energy music that seeks to bring audiences together in a joyous racket.

Formed in 2016 to perform a tribute concert for the late Ornette Coleman for Jazz North East, this group quickly grew to become John's main project as a composer and bandleader. Taking inspiration from giants like Ornette, Mingus, Misha Mengelberg and the Art Ensemble of Chicago, plus a dash of DIY alternative rock attitude, their music has grown into a creative space all of its own; energetic, off-kilter, celebratory and full of rewards for the adventurous listener.

The quintet has performed across the nation, including sets at Gateshead International Jazz Festival at The Sage and Lancaster Jazz Festival, plus a successful tour across the North of England in 2019. The quintet were selected by Jazz North as Northern Line ambassador artists that same year, presenting them with a supportive platform to bring their music to audiences all over the North and beyond. Well received gigs at legendary venues such as Matt & Phreds (Manchester) and The Lescar (Sheffield) are testament to the awesome effect of hearing the Quintet in action.

The debut album from the group, 'Mixed with Glass', was released January 2021, on the New Jazz and Improvised Music Recordings label. Called "a big-hearted debut from a band to watch out for" (Jazzwise), the album features an entirely original set of compositions, spanning the full range of sounds and emotional spaces the band have explored after years of playing and learning together.

In 2023 John convened the band to record the long-awaited follow-up album, with support from Help Musicians via a Peter Whittingham Jazz Award. Recorded live at legendary North East space the Star & Shadow Cinema this new album is due for release in late 2023.

Shapeshifters - a contemporary jazz trio consisting of three collaborators: Anna Chandler, Sam Quintana and Steve Hanley. Grounded in the tradition, the trio combine influences from the likes of Mingus, Fly Trio and the Tristano School.

The ethos of the band is to embrace the spontaneity and openness gifted by the line-up, morphing in direction at the flick of a switch and constantly challenging improvisation fearlessly and unapologetically.

What began as just an ensemble, for rehearsing ideas and sketches, very quickly turned into an original project inspired by what the band had explored and developed.

The debut album 'Shapeshifters' was released in January 2021 during the pandemic. This included snippets from some streamed events, as well as some specifically created video performances. The broadcast was made in conjunction with the label 'NewJazz Records' and included an interview with the label executive.

The album has a raft of acclaimed reviews and the title track has been selected and showcased on multiple Spotify playlists, raising the profile of the trio, during a time when the pandemic made it more challenging to promote the band through the traditional touring circuit.

Performing a mix of original material and unique re-workings of the standards repertoire, the group produces a coherent narrative whilst still keeping you on your toes, unsure as to what might happen next.

Thomas Dixon

Saxophonist and bandleader Thomas Dixon, having been inspired by his time in the ICP's Dutch Improv Academy, is now the founder and facilitator for the Thursday Night Prayer Meeting.

As well as being inspired by the radical free jazz records of the early 1960s, he's also strongly moved by British dance club culture, and African township musics, which can be seen clearly in his other musical projects: DILUTEY JUICE, Kancho Club, and Hannabiell & Midnight Blue.

Thursday Night Prayer Meeting is an invitation to share in the joys of improvised music. On the first Thursday of every month the night begins by bringing guest performers to the stage, and then putting together small groups from the audience to improvise together.

Free from the boundaries of genre, the Prayer Meeting encourages music makers of all styles, backgrounds, and perceived levels of ability to come play together. Everyone should have access to improvised music, either as an audience member or participant. PA, drum kit and keyboard are provided and you are encouraged to bring anything else you'd like to make noise with.

For this festival edition David Birchall will visit the Prayer Meeting to perform in a unique trio formation with Thomas Dixon and John Pope.

David Birchall

David Birchall is a guitarist, free improviser, composer and organiser living in Manchester, UK. He has performed in the UK, Europe, Russia, Palestine, USA & Japan. He has undertaken artist residencies at The Penthouse (2014, Manchester, UK) and Beppu Project (2017, Beppu, JP). His work has been broadcast on BBC Radio 3, BBC Radio 6 Music, SWR in Germany, WFMU in the US & ABC in Australia.

David Birchall plays in the free form rock band Historically Fucked with Otto Willberg, Odie Ji Ghast & Alex Pierce, This Friend Ship Is Sailing with Maggie Nicols, Odie Ji Ghast & Sam Andreae, Spacefood with Adam Fairhall & Johnny Hunter and Minimum Wage Immanence Unit with Adam Fairhall & Michael Perrett, alongside many other musicians in ad hoc situations including Marshall Allen, Phil Minton, Mark Sanders, Alan Wilkinson, Toshimaru Nakamura, Hannah Marshall, Lee Patterson and Richard Harrison.

He organises the Curious Ear series for improvised music in Manchester which he co-founded with Andrew Cheetham in 2017.


As a writer she has released several critically acclaimed albums and trained as a film composer at the NFTS, writing music for documentary, independent film, TV and silent film.

As a performer and promoter of free improvised music Sebastian has participated in numerous collaborations including concerts and radio broadcasts in the UK, France, Germany, Hungary, Spain, and Canada.

Martin Mayes

Horn player Martin Mayes is an Improviser, composer and workshop leader, he has worked with the Cecil Taylor European Orchestra, English Gamelan Orchestra, and Spontaneous Music Orchestra alongside Lol Coxhill, Maggie Nicols and Evan Parker to name just a few.

His projects, which are often site-specific, interweaving choreographic and theatrical elements with a strong element of storytelling, range from medieval music and the traditions of the French trompe de chasse to radical improvisation. His projects include the quintet How to Shout & Blow Horns (horns and alphorns with the London-based quartet Horns Aloud); the duo PoliErranti (horn, alphorn and Italian bagpipes); the Turin-based trio Jörð (horn, bass, voice, objects & noise).

His music has taken him from mountain tops to underground caves and stone quarries; from village gardens to ancient cave churches; from abandoned buildings to historic palaces.
